## Contemporary Issues

This course is designed to cover issues and events that are happening in the contemporary world. The topics that we will cover are ones that influence our individual lives as well as our community and country. We will dive into the causes and effects of major local, state, national, and international events. Students will learn how to effectively research information, disseminate that research, defend their findings using evidence, and hold intellectual conversations with their peers. The goal of this course is to make students more aware of these events and the different perspectives of each issue, while also developing fundamental research and discussion skills

#### **Online Learning Norms**

Because of the COVID 19 Pandemic, some or all of our course will be held in an online environment. While we are in our online classroom all students and myself are expected to adhere to the following behavioral norms. These norms apply to both synchronous (live) online learning and asynchronous (independent) learning

## 1. Be respectful

a. Students and staff should show each other respect at all times, even when in the online learning environment. This means not speaking over another individual (mute your microphone until it is your turn to speak), do not send inappropriate or offensive content to other students or staff

#### 2. Be on time

a. Students are expected to join their online classes 5-10 minutes before the scheduled start of class. This gives students time to begin their introductory activities, handle any technology issues, etc... before the start of class.

#### 3. Be present and active

a. Students are expected to be active and present in their online classes. Students should leave their cameras turned on at all times, ask questions, complete all activities, remain in the live class (do not go on to other websites or complete other tasks) and ask for help when needed.

#### 4. Be mindful of your language.

a. Students should use professional language when typing or speaking. This means using complete sentences, avoiding short hand and abbreviations, avoiding excessive punctuation, avoiding all caps, and using appropriate and academic language. Students should use correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

#### 5. Be mindful of plagiarism

a. Students should only submit work that is completely their own. Students are not allowed, in any circumstance or capacity, to copy someone else's work (either a classmate, peer, or from an outside source) and submit it as their own. Any time an outside source is used students should properly cite and reference the source in their work.
