Online Learning Norms

1. Be respectful

Students should use correct grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

5. Be mindful of plagiarism

a. Students should only submit work that is completely their own. Students are not allowed, in any circumstance or capacity, to copy someone else's work (either a classmate, peer, or from an
